



Sex education element of RSE(relationships and Sex education) -from Sep 2022

Christian values underpinning learning: *Together we love and respect. We are creative, we are determined, we are confident, we are kind.*

Intent

From September 2020 teaching of relationships in primary schools is compulsory; sex education remains the decision of governors. We see parents and carers are the main educators of children in these aspects; school must complement and reinforce this role. **The sex education content is taught alongside the PSHE scheme of work where relationships work is a key area of learning.**

The PSHE (including relationships) scheme meets the requirements of the Equality Act. St Blaise will not unlawfully discriminate against pupils because of their age, sex, race, disability, religion or belief, gender reassignment, pregnancy or maternity, marriage or civil partnership, or sexual orientation (collectively known as the protected characteristics), reasonable adjustments to alleviate disadvantage and be mindful of the SEND Code of Practice when planning for these subjects.

Implementation

Sex education will be taught in conjunction with the PSHE scheme of work; RSE forms part of these lessons. Relationships threads through the PSHE scheme of work. Learning will be linked to topics where possible or taught as separate units of work. The scheme will be adjusted to meet the needs of the pupils in our care and any current issues. Our teaching will be sensitive and age appropriate in approach and content. LGBT will be taught across the broader curriculum as part of the work on inclusion.

Parents

Parents have the right to excuse their children from the sex education element, which is why we have separated it from the main scheme; this makes the learning that will be covered clear to all.

Parents will be informed in Y1/2 about the content of The Pants Rule teaching – home support resources will be provided.



Y3/4 – reproduction in plants and animals

Parents will be informed in Y5/6 about the content of upcoming lessons. Materials sent home to support this unit of work.

Sex education will be taught by school staff. Staff members have the right to be supported and withdraw if they do not feel comfortable in teaching this content.

Year One/ Two



- External body parts lessons will be taught as part of the science curriculum. An additional lesson in this topic will include introducing the female and male genitals.
- Human body from birth to old age – this will be taught as part of the science curriculum This work will include babies growing into toddlers and will include visits from babies and pre-schoolers. This will not include puberty but will link into older ages.

Year Three/Four

- Reproduction of plants and animals linked to Rainforest topic

Year Five/ Six

- Puberty and menstrual cycle work will be delivered to both Y5 and Y6 each year. These are not topic related
- Conception, consent and FGM will be taught in Y6 only. These are not topic related
- A resource box will be kept in Maple class – it will contain relevant books and practical resources
